DID YOU KNOW?

'I have read the terms and conditions' is sometimes jokingly called the biggest lie on the internet.

Is it OK to just click 'I agree' when you download an app? And what does it mean when you give an app access to your microphone and camera? You're about to find out!

EXERCISE 1

Apps gather data from your smartphone. Some data they need in order to function. Some data they gather in order to sell to advertisers.

Look at the table below. What data do you think these types of apps need in order to work well? Work with a classmate. Discuss why you think certain data is(n't) necessary and fill in the table.

2. Now for part two of your phone clean-up: you are going to look at your apps' permissions.

For android: go to 'instellingen > apps en meldingen > app-machtigingen'

For iOS: go to 'instellingen > privacy'

If you think the app doesn't need to have permission in order to work, switch it off, open the app and try if it still works. Compare your settings to your classmate's; how are they different? And why are they different? Help each other out and ask for help if you're stuck on a problem.

- Was it difficult to change your settings?
- What settings did you change?
